There have been major changes in the last few months at Fairfield yet these have, we hope, maintained the continuity of our 'Christ-centred, people-focused, outward-looking' church. After four years working in our staff team Tim Goodall (Pastor) and Tom Rawling (Evangelist) moved on in the Spring and another member of the staff team, Chris Reveley, has been appointed as the new Pastor. Tim has gone on to be Pastor at Tile Kiln Church in Chelmsford while Tom has become Director of the Aylesbury Vale Youth For Christ organisation and, as a church, we deeply appreciate all that they have been and done during their time in Northwood Hills – we shall miss them.

Chris is enjoying his new challenge. He has for many years been a Management Consultant whose more recent clients included Balfour Beatty, Visa, Monarch Airlines and Thistle Hotels, and he has also been part-time as Assistant Minister at Fairfield for several years until being appointed Pastor in April 2016.

As a church we have also recently reviewed and modified the format of our Sunday worship but, as before, we still our service at 10am as before. With lots of children and young people coming, our service commences with all ages meeting together but then, after a break which includes coffee, we have teaching in appropriate age groups for all.

We continue to run a wide range of mid-week church activities (please see the website for more information www.nhec.org.uk) as well as our building being used by many others for external events too. In fact, in June we gave out over 500 'The King the Queen serves' books to people using our building in the month leading up to the Queen's 90th Birthday. One of the biggest challenges people have with our church building is finding it! In case you don't know where we are, we are tucked away behind the Joel Street shops - turn down Windsor Close which is the road with the new Costa Coffee on the corner and then turn left after just 25 meters and we are straight ahead.

As Christmas approaches we will again be organising some carol singing in Joel Street, and having our Young Families Christmas Party and other celebratory events- please see the website for more information. As usual we will be holding our Christmas Carol Service which this year will be at 6pm on Sunday 18th December followed by mince pies/drinks. All are welcome to this or to any of our church events.

It is with deep regret and sadness that we report the death of Lishman Easby, a former chairman and Vice President of NHRA

Lishman was born on the 16th August 1921 in the small town of Eston just outside Middlesbrough.

He left school before his 14th birthday and went to work as an apprentice architect in Thirsk. At that early age he was sent out to remote farms on his bike in order to measure up buildings for refurbishment or extension. He stayed in this profession until he joined the RAF in 1941

He trained as a Wireless Operator/Air Gunner on Lancasters, and was posted to 100 Squadron, Waltham, where they were given a brand new Lancaster named the "Phantom of the Ruhr". The same name today adorns the Lancaster which flies as part of the "Battle of Britain Memorial Flight". The Phantom completed 21 ops to Germany and 2 to Italy, after which it was taken in for extensive repairs due to enemy damage. Lishman was demobbed in 1946 and then became a wages inspector for the Minister of Agriculture travelling around the farms making sure people were paid correctly.

He was moved in 1965 to Northwood Hills to work at Tolcarne Drive for the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food. .

Apart from his children and grandchildren and years in the RAF, another highlight of his life was serving as Chairman of the Northwood Hills Residents Association. He loved being involved in the local community and made good friends through this work.

He was the most selfless person, so interested in every person he encountered. He always put his family first, but was always willing to do anything for someone else. He will always be remembered for his kindness and caring nature.

Friends of Eastcote House Gardens

The Friends group was formed in June 2008, with the aim of restoring the gardens and outbuildings of the former Eastcote House demolished in 1974. The gardens and remaining buildings many dating back to the 17th century, are on the nine acre site that had been badly neglected for years. Recently added to the groups domain is the eleven acre Long Meadow, Site of Importance for Nature Conservation.

Since 2008 the Friends Group have met tirelessly, starting on the third Thursday of the month, now meeting five times a month and supplemented this with additional Saturday/ Sunday Volunteers Days aimed at encouraging greater community participation.

The work involved is not that of simply digging out and re-planting flowerbeds;

- To date the group have secured a Lottery Grant of £24,000 to re-plant the Walled Garden;
- secured a major donation from Taylor Wimpey to restore the rockery;
- secured funding from the London Borough of Hillingdon to remake pathways and enhance the entrances to the gardens.
- Obtained a grant of £20,000 from The Mayor of London's Big Green Fund to assist with improvements to the River Pinn and Long Meadow with match funding of 10K from Hillingdon Council.
- Northwood Hills Residents' Association has also contributed by providing funding for seed to create a wild flower meadow;
- Hillingdon Council have provided tools and equipment;
- Waitrose have donated £300;
- And the volunteers have raised funds through Community Picnics , Tea gardens and other events.
- Local schools and uniformed groups have been encouraged to visit to take part in bulb planting events and to learn about local history and their heritage.

But the greatest achievement of the Friends Group has been to secure a grant from the Heritage Lottery fund of £1.3m to restore the Tudor stables, the Dovecote and the Walled Garden, It took thousands of hours to plan and write the successful bid document. A herculean effort!

During the restoration work , which is by no means complete, the Friends have also been recognised by London in Bloom, receiving their Level 6 Champion of Champions Award; their Gold Award Category runner up for Park of the Year: and 2nd place (Discretionary Award from the Worshipful Company of Gardeners) Community Garden.

This remarkable Friends Group have created a land mark which is now widely enjoyed by the community (all age groups including those with disabilities), and a historical heritage legacy for future generations to enjoy in years to come.

The sewers of Northwood Hills were only designed to take away water, human waste and toilet roll tissue. Anything else can (and does) collect in pipes preventing sewerage from flowing and can cause it to back up. The first you may be aware of a problem is when sewerage floods into your home, garden or the street. Not only can this have a devastating impact on the environment it can have an impact on your (and your families) health too!

Sewer flooding is a truly miserable experience and we all need to take care to prevent it from happening.

Please, please think carefully when putting anything down your sink, toilet or drain.

Our New Logo



The Residents Association was formed in 1932, but our Logo only dates back to 1992 when the then Committee decided a logo was required. Prior to that there was no official logo, but “The Clump”, the island of trees in Northwood Way which we believe were preserved when the area was developed, were shown on the front cover of the newsletter.

Our new logo, which was officially adopted by members at our AGM in May has been designed by local graphic designer Miles Gillman of Miles Gillman Associates.

The 3 hills that influenced the name Northwood Hills in 1930 Haste Hill, Pinner Hill and the Hogs Back have been retained, as they depict the greenery of the area, and the houses, which can also be taken as trees, depict the important domestic scene and our aim to safeguard residents from unacceptable development.

Northwood School

Outstanding GCSE results

Northwood School students celebrated another set of outstanding results this summer with 76% of students achieving GCSEs in both English and maths

Mark Anderson, Headteacher, commented, “On average our students have made over half a grade better than expected progress in every one of their subjects. Year on year Northwood students have consistently produced some of the best results in the area, but none of this would have happened without the hard work and dedication of the students themselves, combined with the unstinting support they’ve had from their teachers and parents. I am proud of each and every student.”

ITV London visits Northwood

It was lights, camera and action at Northwood School as ITV London visited the school this September. The news report wanted to explore the challenge the school currently faces in coping with its popularity in our Potter Street building and to highlight that, thanks to the support of the London Borough of Hillingdon, we have a brand new building to move into which will help meet the demand for student places, but as also provide the students as well as the local community with a state of the art facility that will serve generations to come.

The students were delighted to see themselves on television that evening and were particularly proud to see their new school.

New School Building

It is anticipated that we will move into our new building during the week beginning **17th October**. This will mean our new entrance will be on Pinner Road. However, the project will still not be completed as Phase 2 will begin in November. This will involve the demolition of the existing school which is to be replaced with new Rugby and Football pitches, as well as the completion of an all-weather football pitch.

Our Open Evening on the **10th October** will be take place at the new school and we are looking to organise a Saturday open morning for family and local residents later in November so that everybody gets the opportunity to visit our fantastic new building.



St. John's is very proud of its excellent learning environment and facilities but we also think that it is a vital part of our boys' education that they learn about and help those in our local and wider community who are less fortunate than us. To this end we support a number of charities throughout the academic year including Macmillan Cancer Research, the Royal British Legion, Comic Relief and Action Medical Research. In addition each year we focus on one main charity. Last year we supported Great Ormond Street Hospital and enjoyed a variety of fund raising activities from quizzes to sponsored walks in fancy dress. In July we were able to present a cheque to Naomi Angel from G.O.S.H. for £15,300.



This year we are going local and teaming up with two Northwood Schools, St. Helen's and Merchant Taylors', to support PHAB – Physically Handicapped and Able Bodied. This charity strives to give opportunities for disabled youngsters to spend time with able bodied children and young people of their own age, whether it be at the Friday night Youth Club, soon to be launched, or on the Easter week long residential activity week at Merchant Taylors' School. We hope that St John's boys will be involved on a practical level as well as fund raising for extra vital equipment and activities for the guests over the course of the year.



Police Report

Since the recent awful attacks in France, officers have been visiting our local Churches and are keen to visit other faith groups around Northwood. Where possible we would like to attend services and events so if there is anything you would like us to attend please get in contact.

Whilst working later shifts officers have been conducting plain clothes patrols around the borders of Hertfordshire and Harrow in an attempt to catch cross boarder motor vehicle offences. This comes after Hertfordshire officers arrested two males recently in Northwood for breaking into a car.

We have had some good results recently with public order offences and have issued several Penalty Notices for Disorder to suspects, after allegations of swearing in the street, and some allegations of common assaults.

After reports of mopeds and motorbikes riding along Joel Street and Pinner Road/Rickmansworth Road causing excessive noise and committing traffic offences, officers have stopped several riders when possible and some have been issued with Section 59 warning letters, meaning that if they are seen again riding antisocially we can seize their bike.

We are also collating a log of all known registrations and bike models/makes to help make it easier to identify them.

GOOD NEWS STORY -

PC Groome recently had to traverse a ladder and climb in through a first floor window of a house, before breaking down an interior door and unlocking the front door of the property so that the occupier could get in. The resident had sadly misplaced their keys and thanks to PC Groome the resident did not need to call out a locksmith, as he had left the interior door intact.

CRIME PREVENTION ADVICE -

At this time we would like to give advice regarding jewellery, particularly Asian Gold. Items like bangles, necklaces, earrings etc are a target for any burglar.

A while ago the police produced some leaflets about the safety of your jewellery. We are now looking to distribute these on our patrols.

If keeping high value jewellery at you home please ensure it is locked away in a safe, preferably one that is drilled into a wall and make sure the items are listed on your home and contents insurance and photographs taken.

Always a priority for us, if anyone would like to join an existing Neighbourhood Watch Scheme, or co-ordinate a new one, please contact us via email or phone.

BURGLARY FIGURES -

As our main priority crime, burglary is always something we strive to reduce. With SMARTWATER still being distributed across Hillingdon we hope that every house will eventually be marked up.

The residential burglary figures for the last 3 months are below.

In the last 3 Months - 17 residential burglaries

Of those 17, 11 were in the last 2 months, 5 were in the last month.

This shows some reduction in the last few months and is a large reduction from the figures we were having last year.

Medical Column

Are you due to see a Hospital Specialist?

Here is a short guide towards ensuring that you have a satisfactory consultation with your specialist. Although your GP will have written a referral letter containing all the necessary clinical details, the specialist will need to quiz you in order to understand how your condition affects you so that he can make a plan to assist you in getting better.

1. It is useful to **list your main symptoms in order of severity** and to briefly describe how each symptom affects your day-to-day living.
2. Make a **short list of the questions** you would like answered. If you have been really worried that your symptoms could herald something serious, then do not feel shy of including such questions.
3. If the consultant offers you a number of **treatment options**, then it would be useful to have a frank discussion of the benefits and potential harm of all the options to enable you to make the best choice of treatment.
 - o Why do you think this operation/procedure/treatment is necessary?*
 - o What are the benefits, risks and success rates of the options?*
 - o What are the risks if I decide to do nothing for the time being?*
 - o What support will I need in the first few days/weeks afterwards?*
 - o When am I likely to be able to get back to my normal function?
(Work, activities, relationships, diet, etc.)*
4. If an **operation or a procedure** is being recommended, ask the following questions:
 - o What can you recommend to minimise my risk of complications?*
 - o What should I do between now and my operation to maximise my recovery?*
 - o Will my medication need adjustment prior to the operation?*
 - o Is there any other information you can provide or direct me to, that will help?*
 - o Have you noted my medication allergies in your records?*
 - o Before the specialist treats you, they must ask for and gain your written consent. So please ensure you are satisfied with the answers. Remember also that if you later change your mind, you are entitled to withdraw consent – even after signing.*
5. **Planning for the operation**
 - o If you are a smoker, giving up weeks before the operation reduces the risk of chest problems and makes your anaesthetic safer. It is advisable to give up 12 weeks before your operation. Your GP Nurse can help you quit.*
 - o See your dentist beforehand if you have any loose teeth or crowns*
 - o If you have long-standing medical problems (e.g. heart, diabetes, asthma, high blood pressure, etc) and/or are taking a large number of medicines it might be useful to see your GP to ensure your conditions are stable and review your medicines.*
